




# Invent & Test a Futures Exercise

## BRIEF DESCRIPTION

Every work area in the UN has its own specific contexts and requirements, and therefore merit having their own bespoke tools. This tool can be used as a guide for **inventing your own futuring tool for intergenerational equity.** It starts by helping you identify parameters for your tool, then you proceed **step-by-step** to design a prototype. This tool requires **at least two sessions** - one to invent your own tool following these instructions and a second to test your tool to find out what it can do.

## HOW IT SUPPORTS INTERGENERATIONAL EQUITY

Invention of new futures exercises requires many dynamic modes of considering future and answering planning-oriented questions like: What would be useful to ourselves and others in the future? Creative processes aim toward production and appreciating novel ideas, and engaging them helps a group practice Appreciating Novelty. Collaboration with others can involve Intercultural Competences. Making a tool of your own for your own benefit is an expression of a group's Sense of Agency.





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## **CONCISE INSTRUCTIONS**

- Invite a small group to invent a Futuring Tool for Intergenerational Equity with you.
- Agree to review the tools already included in the tool inventory before your first meeting. Reflect upon: What tools do we wish we had in addition to these?
- Meet to discuss loose parameters for your new futuring tool. Ask two questions: (1) What functions and features does this tool need to have? (2) Which capabilities do we want our tool to help us develop? (See 'Supports' column, first page.)
- In a later meeting (e.g. 1 week), elaborate what kinds of concrete actions tool users would take. Think in steps and sequences.
- Prepare your tool: Write the instructions, and prepare any 'design templates' or materials needed to use the tool.
- Test your newly invented tool.
- After, use Tool R. to Reflect on how it functions and what value it can generate.
- Share your tool via Inventory of Futuring Intergenerational Equity.
